About Reflective Structured Dialogue

OUR EVIDENCE-BASED APPROACH

Reflective Structured Dialogue (RSD) is an evidence-based and research-driven methodology that can transform relationships, deepen belonging, dispel stereotypes, and reduce polarization.

RSD helps build trust and connections across differences of identities, perspectives, and values in order to foster more inclusive cultures, solve problems collaboratively, and make systemic change possible.

Through ongoing research and innovation, Essential Partners (EP) has continued to refine and innovate the RSD approach. The past 10 years have seen the Dialogic Classroom pedagogy emerge for middle grades, high school, and higher education classrooms, providing our next generation of leaders with the capacities needed for an open, diverse, inclusive democratic society to flourish.

Recent grant funding has also allowed EP experts to develop Essential Photovoice, blending advancements in mobile technology with visual media and RSD.

A Note from the Executive Directors

It's cliché to say this has been an unprecedented year. But that is precisely what we have experienced.

The October 7th attacks and ensuing conflict upended every partnership that was already underway and raised a tidal wave of need all across the United States. Polarization around the conflict continues to reverberate in civic institutions, college campuses, nonprofits, schools, workplaces, public libraries, and congregations of every faith tradition.

In these tumultuous moments, we are especially grateful to our visionary founders and dedicated practitioners. Their courageous work around Israel-Palestine provides decades of wisdom and experience to draw upon today. These insights inform every aspect of our approach to the current conflict.

We expected this year to be dominated by the election. We planned guides and resources, free public programs, pro-bono consultation, coaching, and robust Community of Practice support. And despite the intense pressures of the war, conversations about the election have continued apace. We've helped hundreds of teachers, campus leaders, and communities navigate political division.

Of course, we know that these polarizing flashpoints also heighten and complicate local challenges, of which there are many: colleges facing legal difficulties, students still recovering from pandemic closures, housing shortages, and other economic pressures.

Discussions of a town budget transform into arguments about the election just as conversations about Israel-Palestine are shaped by local context and individual relationships. Our ability to help people navigate both local and international conflicts underscores the brilliance of our founders and the power of our Reflective Structured Dialogue approach.

RSD is not just a model for hard conversations. It is a way of living, working, and learning together. When we can navigate challenges with openness and care, we can recover our humanity, curiosity, and sense of community together.

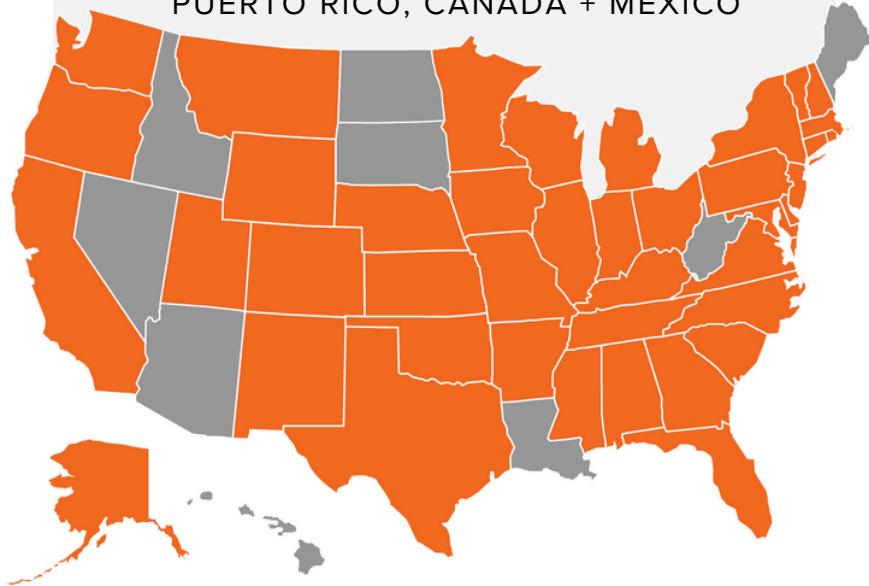

Its consequences have reverberated from Congress to college campuses, public schools, and faith communities. Drawing on decades of experience with dialogues around Israel-Palestine—and thanks to crucial donor generosity—we have supported thousands of partners nationwide with free consultations, small-group coaching, training, and multiple free resources—including the [definitive dialogue guide](#). Polarization driven by this conflict threatens our communities, our institutions, and our democracy. We will continue to help repair trust, rebuild community, and revive the nation’s ability to live together with dignity.

The changing candidates, political violence, court cases, threats, and racist tropes of this Presidential election season have bred chaos, division, and dysfunction in communities across the country. Thanks to generous donor support, we have responded with new free guides and resources, classroom curricula, and coaching—and by activating our Community of Practice. In more than 75 communities across 20 states, our Community of Practice members have pledged to lead dialogues about election and political partisanship where they live, work, worship, or learn. Equipped with our RSD framework, they are disrupting the cycle of polarization, inspiring hope and faith in our diverse democracy.

Thanks to **The Fetzer Institute**’s vision and support, Essential Partners just completed a multi-year innovation partnership with Interfaith Photovoice that led to the creation of Essential Photovoice. This adaptation blends Reflective Structured Dialogue with components of photovoice. Essential Photovoice leverages visual media as an entry point to dialogues that disrupt polarization, deepen mutual understanding and strengthen community connections. Residents from thirteen communities were trained in the new approach and supported via a robust community of practice. This project showcases the power of a visionary funder to spur collaboration and innovation. The Fetzer Institute was instrumental in the creation of a groundbreaking dialogue model.

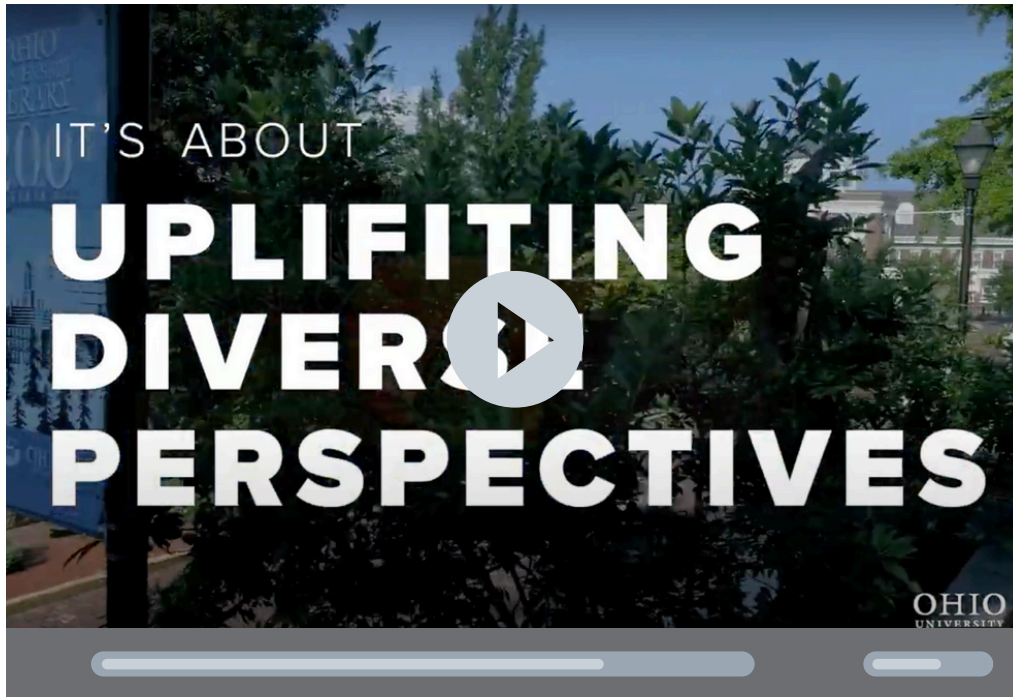
Reimagining the IEP Process

Since 2020, demand has surged for Individualized Education Plans (IEPs), the special education plans that ensure students with disabilities can thrive. Too often, however, IEP meetings can be tense, straining the relationships between caregivers and schools. When educators, caregivers, and support staff are not aligned, students pay the price. With **Power of Place Learning Communities** and a network of public schools, we are working to reimagine how educators and administrators can facilitate IEP meetings to foster strong relationships and healthy communication among educators, caregivers, and staff. These are the hallmarks of exceptional education, and we are determined to make the exceptional the norm for students in Massachusetts and beyond.





IMPACT STORY: CAMPUS CULTURE CHANGE

Ohio University Makes Respect Visible

In 2021, Ohio University launched Make Respect Visible, a campus-wide effort to build a school culture upon a powerful set of academic and community values:

- **Listen More, Judge Less**
- **Encourage Dialogue, Not Division**
- **Spread Ideas, Not Hate**
- **Remember that Every Voice Counts**



“The next phase will focus on establishing a campus-wide framework for engaging the community in difficult conversations and dialogues across difference.”

We have supported this inspiring initiative by consulting with leaders and training campus facilitators, including a core group of students who will lead campus dialogues about polarizing issues like the 2024 Election. The inaugural Make Respect Visible Week was held this fall. It included community dialogues, a public art project, and other events shaped by their collaboration with EP.

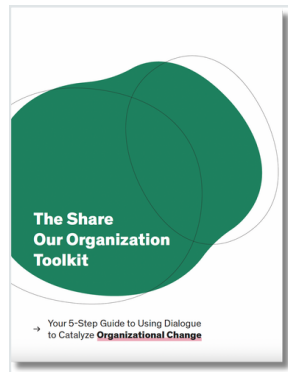

This powerful free toolkit, designed specifically for organizational culture change, has been downloaded by hundreds of nonprofit and business leaders around the globe already.

By engaging leaders from local service-based organizations in open dialogue, the **Gloucester Health Department** hoped to create a more comprehensive understanding of the complex challenges faced by the community. A series of facilitated dialogues brought together 28 leaders from 24 organizations serving Gloucester. Participants discussed their most important services, the needs they encounter, and their biggest post-COVID challenges. Based on the insights gathered from the dialogues, the public health department developed a comprehensive report to drive more effective solutions. Through an innovative, community-driven, dialogic approach, the public health department was able to identify the most effective strategies and resources for addressing the community's most urgent needs.

Financial Report

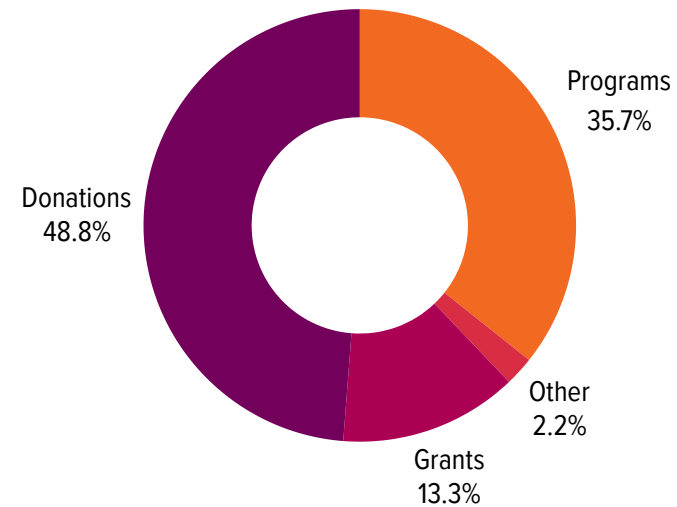
No report quite captures the scale of the crisis this year the way these financial charts do.

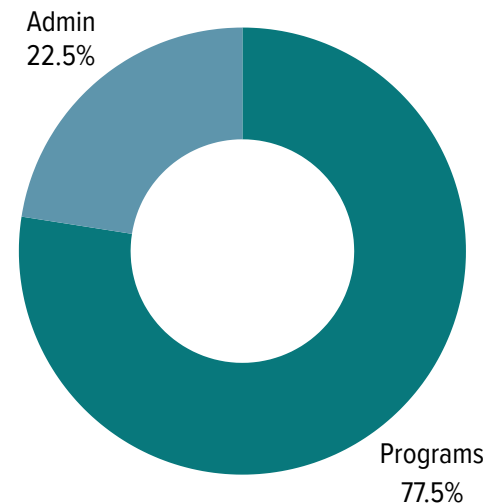

FY24 REVENUE: \$2,536,604

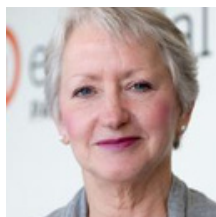
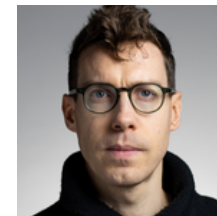
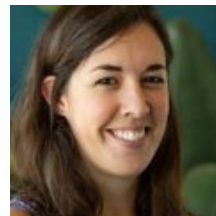


FY24 EXPENDITURES: \$1,931,199

Located across the country, our practitioners bring diverse experience to their work with Essential Partners. They include veteran educators, lawyers, mediators, and faith leaders.

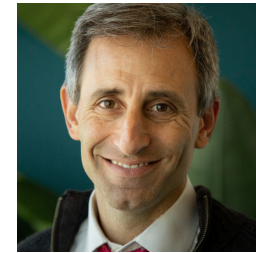


Our Leadership
